# Esperanto continued from August issue

#### Pronunciation.

Esperanto pronunciation is relatively simple, though there are some sounds that do not occur often in English (then of course, the TH sound we know and love does not occur in Japanese).

The Esperanto alphabet has 28 letters, most of which are pronounced like their English counterparts.

- as in father (ah...like the French La) A
- B C as in english
- t his is tricky...like ts, as in hot sun, but run together. try it a couple of times ts ts ts you'll get the hang of it.
- À D as the English CH in CHurCH.
- as in English
- as in bet. (eh. NEVER as in here or the)
- E F G as in English
- as in get. NEVER as in gem.
- A H as in gem.
- as in English
- A as the ch in the scottish loCH (also the German ch) Don't worry, few words use this one.
- as the ie in niece. NEVER as in mile Ł
- J as the English Y or the German J
- A K as the s in pleasure. (zh) also, the french j in je.
- as in English
- L as in English
- Μ as in English
- as in English
- N O as in november .... but do not put the w sound after it! All Esperanto vowels are pure.
- Ρ as in English
- R as in English, but trilled, if you can.
- S as in sun, NEVER like a z
- Æ as the sh in SHip.
- Т as in English
- U as the oo in Moose (not for you native South Carolinians who make the word root sound like rook). Say it like the oo in tool.
- Ε this one is actually a consonant. It is like the W in way.
- V as in English.
- Z as in Zoo.

Now we can practise the pronunciation by learning the numbers.

You can form all other numbers below 1\*10<sup>6</sup> (1 000 000) with simple juxtaposition. Eleven is simply "ten and one", but we leave out the "and" (as in English we are supposed to say "one hundred one" not "one hundred and one") and say "ten one"

Ok, now then. It is time to learn some basic Esperanto, just enough to whet your appetite, and to get you to write to Esperanto League of North America, ELNA.

#### NOUNS

These are the words used to name objects, both physical (table, dog) and abstract (war, emotion). In Esperanto ALL nouns in the singular end in the letter o.

patro a father kuko a cake knabo a boy pano (a loaf of) bread amiko a friend akvo water filo a son papero (a sheet of) paper instruisto a teacher plumo a pen

To make them plural, simply add j to the o. (remember, J has the sound of Y in english, so oj in Esperanto is like the oy in boy)

patroj fathers kukoj cakes knaboj boys panoj loaves of bread amikoj friends

All nouns follow these rules...NO EXCEPTIONS!

#### La

La is the definite article (= the). It is used with both singular and plural nouns without change.

la patro the father. la patroj the fathers la kuko the cake la kukoj the cakes

### The Most Challenging Issue Part III Conclusion

#### 1. Changing the Heart

It is possible to change the way we perceive and respond in intercultural relationships:

Their outward conduct is but a reflection of their inward life, and their inward life a mirror of their outward conduct. Baha'u'llah, Baha'í Revelation p89.

We can change our heart and what we feel by working on our conduct, and we can change our behavior by working on the condition of our heart by prayer, teaching, and meditation - it doesn't really matter where we choose to begin, the result will be beneficial.

#### 2. Know one's self

In order to eliminate prejudice it is important to know as much as possible about the workings of one's thought processes, the good and the bad:

"... man should know his own self, and know those things which lead to loftiness or to lowliness... Baha'u'llah, Baha'í World Faith p167

#### 3. Discipline One's Thoughts

It is possible to control what one chooses to think about. This is sometimes seen as a difficult task, in that it requires a mental discipline many people have not learned to master.

... concentrate all the thoughts of your heart on love and unity. When a thought of war comes oppose it by a stronger thought of peace. A thought of hatred must be destroyed by a more powerful thought of love... 'Abdu'l-Baha, Divine Art of Living

#### 4. Monitor Feelings and Choose a Response

One of the practices of Hindu Yoga involves maintaining a conscious awareness of one's emotion state, that is the condition of one's heart. When a negative emotion arises take a moment to check its source before allowing this emotion to produce its usual behavior reaction. If this negative emotion comes from a violation of a culturally-learned and almost invisible rule, (the shell of conventionality) and this rule is not in conformity with Baha'í principles, take time to choose a proper response rather than react as usual; blindly imitating the ways of our ancestors.

#### 5. How other People will Change

People will change their minds about deeply held convictions under the following conditions: 1> the new position is presented in a way that makes sense to them, 2> they trust the person who is presenting this new position, 3> they are not being blamed for having had misinformation.




