

A series of developments here and abroad have irreversibly increased the demands on the community's resources, spiritual, human and material:

- A message from the Universal House of Justice in May reiterated the critical situation of the international funds of the faith, in light of the requirements of the Arc Projects and of specific growth opportunities around the world
- The National Spiritual Assembly has focused on race unity as the paramount strategic objective for the American Baha'í Community
- The US House of Representatives has passed, with broad bi-partisan support, an historic resolution calling for the emancipation of the Persian Baha'í Community
- Local goals for the Bahá'í National Fund represent each Assembly's role in supporting the Administrative Order; 1,161 Local Spiritual Assemblies received suggested goals for the year, while only 180 have responded with commitments of \$1.8 million, or 11% of the projected annual budget
- Credit lines available to the Assembly are almost fully used because essential expenses such as the National Assembly's pledge to the International Fund, administrative costs of the World Congress and the Temple work have outpaced contribution cash flow
- The National Spiritual Assembly is concluding a review of its national organization with the intention of further reducing expenses
- A National Assembly plan is taking shape which will build on a united community's economic and spiritual strengths

The foregoing illustrates the dynamic of crisis and victory so vividly described by Shoghi Effendi. Moreover, within just one year, we have seen:

- The issuance of one of the most widely-distributed, well-received documents in Baha'í history, The Vision of Race Unity: AMerica's Most Challenging Issue

NEW JOHN THE BAPTIST PREACHING UNIVERSAL BROTHERHOOD Abdul Ba-ha, Patriarchal Head of Bahaists in Denver With Message of Love and Justice to All and for All

Venerable, Impressive and Imposing Figure From Oriental Lands Comes to Give, Asking Nothing But to Be Heard.

A venerable man-like, a patriarch of old-his gray beard falling upon his breast, his white locks surmounted by a white turban, his erect figure draped in the flowing garments of Persia, this is Abdul Ba-ha, Abbas Effendi-"Servant of God," teacher of universal religion, universal peace, universal brotherhood. When I say this is Abdul Ba-ha, the statement refer



only to the first fleeting impression of this head of the Bahai movement, who is in Denver spreading the message of brotherly love of the universal religion, which will be the undation of interreligious, interacial and international brotherhood.

For when this aged man-whose presence in the domi nant personality defies age-speaks, when the keen dark eyes become afire with the words he utters-the first impression of Abdul Ba-ha becomes but a superficial one. Yes terday afternoon at the Shirley hotel, surrounded by a staff of attendants, chief of whom is the vividly intelligent and finely educated Dr. Ameen U. Fareed, I was thrilled for an hour by the flow of sonorous words that rolled from the lips of this man of the Orient, who has a message for all this world.

Yesterday afternoon, listening to the rolling sentences quickly translated by Dr. Farced, the interruption of an afternoon tea drinking according to American custom would have been extremely incongruous.

Then it was the aroma of that fragramt tea permeating the room with a soft and subtle perfume that Abdul Ba-Ha added more light upon the Ba-hai movement of which he is the press-ent head and which has witnessed the martyrdom of "the Bab" and the forty years' imprisonment and exile of Ba-ha'o llah.


